Waka Ama NZ Board Report 2014

E ngā mana, e ngā reo, e ngā hau e wha. Tēnā koutou katoa.

For this (my third) Board report I want to briefly reflect on the progress we have made as an organisation, where our strengths are, where we have room for improvement, and how we can individually and collectively add value.

Our Strategic Plan 2012-2015 outlines the key areas of focus:

- growth
- resourcing
- increased accessibility to the sport by both able-bodied and adaptive paddlers
- water safety
- international leadership

Our key strategic goals are:

- maintaining the cultural identity of waka ama
- building the capability of the organisation as a whole
- providing effective leadership across all areas of the sport
- branding and marketing
- building partnerships and relationships
- providing all participants with participation pathways to progress
- rangatahi development
- high performance development

In my last report I suggested the waka ama community in New Zealand/Aotearoa is really like a very large whānau (or perhaps a collection of large whānau). As in any whānau, each club has its own mix of paddlers, administrators, volunteers and leaders. Some clubs are blessed with a good balance of each. I have seen from experience that strong clubs ask their paddlers to do more than just turn up for a paddle – the expectation in healthy clubs is that all members should be willing to contribute to the club in different and other ways. That's what happens in healthy whānau too – everyone has a role to benefit the whole. The issue of everyone making a personal contribution relates to the way we can collectively achieve a number of the above goals.

As we grow towards the formation of nearly a hundred clubs throughout the country, it's wonderful to know that, through the current NZ Waka Ama web site, (and other web sites developed by regions and clubs) all members of clubs and regions now have access to valuable information that in the past was difficult to get hold of. For example, we can quickly find out:

- which sanctioned races are about to take place
- all the latest news about the sport taking place regionally and nationally
- about our sport's history
- how to start up and administer a club
- what a model club organisation looks like (thanks to Mareikura's booklet)
- where all the clubs and who the main contacts are
- useful tips for paddlers
- useful tips to raise funds

and so on.

If information is power, then thanks to the national team (Lara, Conan, Debbie, Amiria) we have all been empowered in a way that was inconceivable three years ago.

We also now have a fully developed and coherent coaching framework that can provide different pathways for personal and professional growth in the future.

While the implementation of the framework is still in its infancy, it is a huge step forward for the sport. Again, this issue relates well to the key focus areas and strategic goals of our strategic plan.

I am particularly pleased about the clear and consistent organisational processes we have developed. For example, we have developed positive relationships with key sponsors like New Zealand Post -Active Post, Sport NZ and Water Safety New Zealand. We have in place sound processes for applying for grants. We make wise use of funding earned through major events (such as the National Sprints). These processes and procedures have helped us build our finances to a healthy position, where we can now mitigate potential financial future risk for at least two years ahead. Our ideal would be for all clubs and regions to be in a similar situation. This is NOT an impossible goal. If the leadership is right at a regional and club level, then anything is possible.

The current Board has developed a clear policies and procedures framework. This enables Board members to accept their roles and responsibilities with confidence. We look forward to further building our governance skills in 2015.

One of our aims is to help build regional strengths. The Board was pleased to meet regional leaders last year to get some sense of what is happening at a regional level. It is to be expected that different regional waka ama bodies have had different degrees of success, depending on the quality of leadership and guidance provided locally. Our assessment is that this is an area that needs further support, and we look forward to creating further dialogue with regional leaders in 2015. We cannot sustain and maintain growth in the sport unless this happens.

In 2014 we lost a number of significant waka ama whānau members - Rawiri Rangitauira and Amster Reedy are examples of active participants who are greatly missed. Let's remember with gratitude all of those who have contributed to and who continue to contribute to our sport's past, present and future. They help to create not just a history but a legacy. In that regards, it has taken us a year to flesh out the concept of a virtual Hall of Fame in order to honour individual contributors, but the idea is now set to be a reality.

Once again my thanks to all the Board whānau - to Dani, Tim, Paul, Trevor, Cherie and Ralph. As the Strategic Plan shows, we still have a lot of work to do in a number of areas. I look forward to harnessing our collective wisdom and passion for the good of the waka ama community by addressing our as yet unfinished business.

Our thanks once again also go to our CE Lara Collins and our operational team – Conan, Debbie and Amiria – and Paul in Waikato Sports. They are a wonderful committed team who are outstanding representatives of our core values. More importantly, they walk the talk.

2013/2014 has been another fabulous year for Waka Ama as we continue to achieve strategic goals and work towards achieving our strategic plan.

Many thanks to Paora Howe for his outstanding contribution as Board Chair, and to the Board Members: Tim Marshall - Deputy Chair, Danielle Rouse, Cherie Collison, Paul Dahl, Trevor Shailer and Ralph Ruka, who have taken on their role so professionally and thoroughly.

This year we carried 15 months in our financial year which reflected the change in end of financial year date to 30 September. From 2014 onwards our financial year will be from 1st October.

Over 15 months to end of September 2014 the sports growth has been 21.6%. Another big growth year across the board with 6 new clubs becoming members taking our total to almost 90 clubs throughout the country.

This growth does not happen by chance and is a direct reflection of the work not only being done at the national office, but also by all the regions and clubs throughout the country.

Over the past 3 years from 2011 our affiliated membership has increased by a staggering 68% .

Below are some of the highlights of this annual period.

WEBSITE

Apart from our people, our website is one of our sports best assets and the key tool we use to promote events and communicate to our membership.

We communicate with our clubs, regions and members constantly. We also link our website with our Waka Ama Facebook Page; this page alone has over 9,900 likes, giving us a reach of around 50,000 people. The Website, Facebook page and Twitter are updated daily at the National Sprints week and throughout the year.

We have further developed our website this year with information that assists clubs and members. The Club Toolkit now has information about Starting a Club, Club Administration, Sanctioning and Event Management, Media, Marketing & Promotion, Club Safety Officer, Club Safety Kete, Managing Volunteers, Social Media for Clubs, Club Info Booklet and other useful Links.

Our WakaPedia pages provided useful info for everyone - our very own Encyclopaedia for all that is Waka Ama.



The Waka Ama NZ Facebook Page (<https://www.facebook.com/wakaama>) is the hub of our social media interaction with our members and the wider community. Our Facebook page is updated daily, and often updated from various races or events as they happen.

Since August 2011 we have had a **990%** increase in the number of likes. We now upload photos directly to our Facebook page during our national events (Sprints, Long Distance and Secondary Schools), this allows paddlers, their families, friends and community to view the photos and share as the event takes place.



Over the past 3 years from 2011 our affiliated membership has increased by a staggering 68% .

NEW ZEALAND POST CORPORATE WAKA AMA CHALLENGE

This event was initiated in 2011 to promote Waka Ama to New Zealand Post staff, as well as to engage and add value with our new partner. In 2013 over 70 teams (approx. 350 New Zealand Post Employees took part) from Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch in regional regattas in the week prior to Christmas.

The winning team from each region qualified for the New Zealand Post Waka Ama National Corporate Challenge, which is held at Lake Karapiro

Feedback from Clubs and regions that coached teams and organised the regattas was very positive and the numbers of New Zealand Post Group staff that have joined clubs and become 'Paddlers' increases every year. We are all looking forward to the next one!



MONTHLY PRIZE DRAW

On the last day of each month we draw 3 affiliated members from our database as prize winners in our Monthly Prize Draw. Each month a \$50 Prezy Card from New Zealand Post is given away along with prizes donated by Equipment Suppliers who advertise on our website.

This initiative has proven popular with our members and has direct benefits for them as well as engaging with New Zealand Post and the suppliers who donate the prizes.





FLIP AND FLOAT WAKA AMA WATER SAFETY ROADSHOW

In 2013 we created a unique Waka Ama pool based water safety road show. The purpose of the Flip and Float sessions is to educate new and experienced paddlers, coaches and parents about life jackets/PFD's, safety requirements, how to flip and re-right a Waka Ama safely and swim to survive techniques.

There were 12 Flip and Float sessions held from October 2013 to June 2014. These sessions we held from as far north as Kaitaia to as far south as Christchurch:

- Auckland
- Pukekohe
- Huntly
- Tokoroa
- Hauraki Plains
- Gisborne
- Napier
- Wellington
- Nelson
- Christchurch



In total 593 paddlers took part in our Flip and Float Waka Ama Safety Roadshow, this included; 441 children, 152 adults from 32 Waka Am Clubs and 11 schools. The Flip and Floats are now in hot demand and will commence again in October 2014 as the sprint season starts.

TIPS AND TRICKS VIDEOS

In 2013 we produced 9 unique Waka Ama Water Safety Tips & Tricks videos. These touched on important water safety issues that are directly associated with Waka Ama. These were a resounding success and were later in the year, re-mastered for television and shown as advertisements on Maori Television throughout the summer.

These clips have been shared on our Facebook Page and YouTube for teams, clubs, paddlers and the key messages have been included in their daily paddling routine.

WORLD SPRINTS

100 paddlers and 30 supporters travelled to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil for the 2014 IVF Va'a World Sprints held from the 12th to 17th of August. Paddlers hailed from all over New Zealand, each paddler received an off-the-water shirt, race singlet and hat with the ActivePost logo on the front and back.

The paddlers performed very well considering the long journey and different conditions. New Zealand won 25 medals altogether, bringing home 1 gold, 16 silver and 8 bronze. New Zealand gear was very popular in Brazil with the majority of paddlers exchanging an NZ item with countries that attended, which included Tahiti, Hawaii, Brazil, Canada, New Caledonia, Great Britain and many more (20 countries altogether).



The New Zealand contingent was fantastic and the team atmosphere created was great. Daily Haka practice and performances were a highlight of the off the water action.

PARA WAKA AMA

Our National Development manager Conan Herbert has held 3 Para Waka Ama have a go sessions over the last year.

In January we organised a Para Exhibition Team that paddled in the New Zealand Post Race at the 2014 Sprint Nationals. We've had great feedback from paddlers and spectators supporting Para Waka Ama. We've had a para seat made and are trialling its suitability. Our goal is to make waka ama accessible to anyone who wishes to take part.



ATAMIRA MAORI IN THE CITY

This event takes place every two years in Auckland City and in 2013 we were invited by Ngati Whātua to take part in the three day event as well as be involved in a Waka Symposium that was being hosted. At our display we included a Waka Ama Erg which proved to be very popular and a great way to interact with a crowd.

Approximately 150,000 people attended the event over 3 days at the Cloud on the Auckland waterfront. ActivePost signage was very visible and we gave branded products to hundreds of attendees that had a go on the erg. Lara gave a presentation at the Waka Symposium on the history of Waka Ama in New Zealand and its significance in Auckland. The symposium was attended by over 60 invited guests including the Auckland Mayor.



SPORT NEW ZEALAND AWARDS – Finalist in the Communication Excellence Category

Waka Ama Zealand was a finalist in the Sport New Zealand Awards held in April 2014. Engagement with membership via a strong web and social media plan saw Waka Ama become one of 3 finalists in this category.



Outward Bound

This year thanks to our partnership with Outward Bound, we secured 11 scholarships for our members to attend an Outward Bound Course. We have received nothing but good feedback from those who have attended these courses and this valuable relationship will continue this year.

Waka Ama NZ Office



Finally I would like to give special mention to the volunteers who manage and organise their clubs, without the dedication of those in all our member clubs we would not be able to achieve all that we have.


