## **RECORD BREAKING NUMBERS AT NATIONALS 2026!**

The 2026 Waka Ama Sprint Nationals will be the largest event ever held on Lake Karāpiro, **with a record number of more than 4,600 paddlers to compete next week.** This is nearly 800 more competitors than in 2025, this event marks the largest Nationals in the history of waka ama, and stands as one of the largest single-sport national events in Aotearoa New Zealand.

The 2026 Waka Ama Sprint Nationals also serve as an official qualifying event for the 2026 International Va'a Federation World Sprint Championships, to be held in Singapore in August 2026. Club intents can be viewed here: <https://www.wakaama.co.nz/racecalendar/lookup/2382>

## **TRAFFIC AND PARKING**

We are excited to have a record number of teams and paddlers competing at the 2026 Sprint Nationals! This brings with it additional challenges re traffic flow and car parking. **You will need to allow extra time to get to the event, to find a car park, and then to find your team.** We need everyone to carpool from your whare please, with fellow team-mates to reduce the number of cars on the road and in the venue.

### **PARKING – WEEK-LONG PASSES**

Car parking will be free for the first day of racing (Sunday 11th January). From Monday onwards, parking will be \$5 per vehicle, per day.

**Week-long Parking passes are available to pre-purchase for \$25.** Week-long passes must be displayed on the vehicle dashboard for clear viewing and must include the vehicle registration number. Passes will be available for purchase from the admin desk at the Don Rowlands Centre, and online **until January 10th** at the Waka Ama Online Shop <https://waka-ama-nz-shop.myshopify.com/>

The last chance to purchase a week-long pass will be directly from the Admin area on Sunday January 11th. Parking passes will not be available for purchase after Sunday. Daily charges will incur as you enter through all venue gates.

### **DISABILITY/MOBILITY PARKING**

Disabled and Mobility Parking is accessed through Gate 3. The parking spaces are located near the drop-off zone, and you must display your Disability/Mobility pass at all times.

## **ID CARDS**

Pre-ordered ID cards can be picked up from the Admin Desk inside the Don Rowlands Centre by the designated Club Coord. Any replacements ordered after 2nd January or at Nationals will cost \$17 each.

## **REPLACEMENT PADDLERS**

As per the race rules, paddlers may only be removed and replaced after the heat of an event by producing a medical certificate from a registered medical practitioner, or the medical first aid team on site. This confirms that the paddler has been examined, and had a legitimate medical reason for not being able to paddle at that particular event and time. Replacement paddlers will need to be actioned at the admin desk onsite.

## **COVID-19**

We understand that COVID-19 may still impact some paddlers and teams. Therefore, should a paddler test positive for COVID-19, they are not required to produce a medical certificate. They may simply send a photo of their positive test to their club coordinator, who must then come to the admin onsite and replace them with an eligible paddler from their club roster. Should the Club have to add a new paddler to their roster to replace the paddler, the late fee for this paddler will be waived. Entry fee and ID card costs will apply as required.

The paddler who tested positive for COVID-19 will not be eligible to race in any further events at the 2026 Waka Ama Sprint Nationals. The paddler must take all COVID precautions as required and isolate offsite in line with Ministry of Health rules.

## **CLUB/REGIONAL COORDINATORS**

Nearly all Clubs have registered their coordinators for this event - ngā mihi nui! This will help us ensure that urgent messages, correction of entries or any other issues are dealt with urgently. It is important that Event organisers can communicate to Regions and Clubs quickly. This will also prevent delays and/or disappointments. 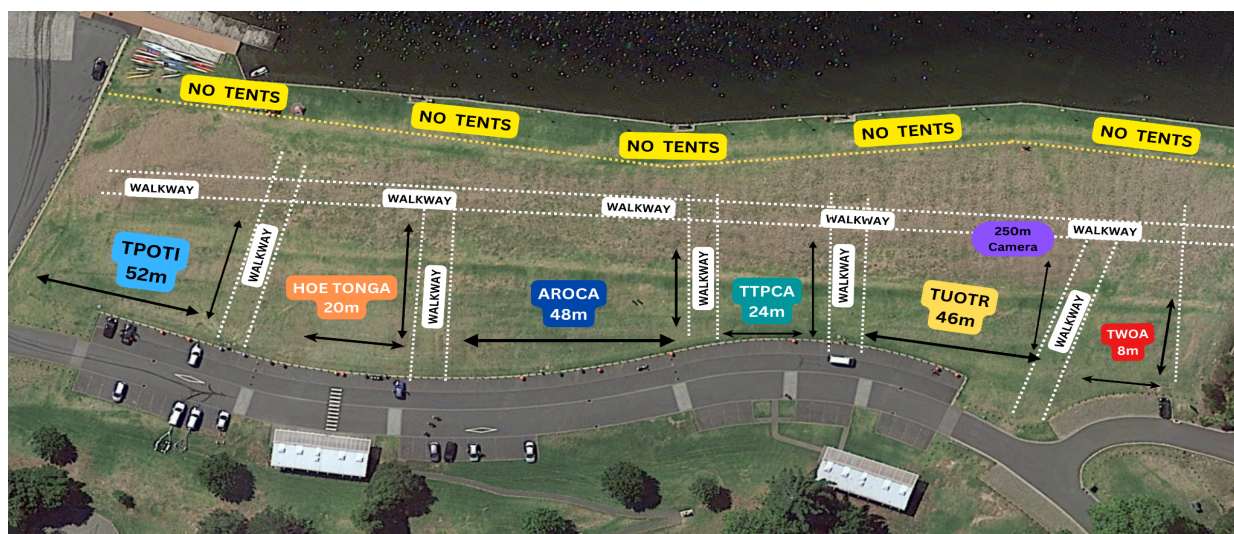
Please respect and follow their instructions at all times, and at the different areas of the event.

We kindly ask all regions to assist at the end of each day to remove the Waka from the water. Many hands make for light work, and an announcement will be made calling for your assistance each day.

## WAKA USE

The W6 waka are kindly loaned by clubs and our Waka Fleet Partner Te Wānanga o Aotearoa. Any team causing damage to any W6/W12 waka at any time during the event will incur the cost of the repairs, which will be charged to the team's club. Please respect the Waka and treat them as you would if they were your own. All contracted W6 waka are used solely for the competition. No contracted waka may be taken or used for training purposes while contracted to the event. This non-permitted use will incur a fine to the offenders' club \$200 per incident.

## **REGIONAL TENT ALLOCATIONS AND SPECTATOR EMBANKMENT**



All clubs must ensure their tents and marquees are set up within your **region's allocated area** and positioned in a way that maximises space and viewing for everyone.  
(End closest to the tower)

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**The short side of all tents must face the lake.**

A clearly marked area of the spectator bank must be kept **completely clear of tents and marquees** to allow for safe pedestrian access see map below. There will also be a marked exclusion zone along the lake edge (10 metres deep). **No tents may be erected within this area**, or behind the tower (on the grass), or in front of the Podium Café.

Any tents or pop-up structures placed on the sloping embankment near the medal dais **must be taken down for prize-giving each day**.

If your club is arranging a hire company to erect tents on your behalf, please ensure the hire company is aware of your **designated regional area**. If you have paid a company to erect your club/regional tent please ask them to check in at the admin area (Don Rowlands Centre) when they arrive onsite and before erecting any tents. They can also contact Aroha (021 809 845) or Lara (027 5484612) for assistance on the day.

**No tents can be erected before midday, Friday 9 January.**

Clubs are responsible for ensuring their tents are correctly placed. Any tents erected in the wrong area or set up in a way that does not maximise space, will be required to be removed. If no club representative can be located, event organisers or regional coordinators may remove the tent on your behalf. All tents must be securely weighted or pegged in a safe manner. Pegging must not create hazards for pedestrians.

## ACC WHĀNAU ZONE

Once again ACC will host the ACC Whānau Zone for supporters, paddlers and wider whānau to relax and watch the racing, as well as trying rongoā (traditional Māori healing).

ACC will also have a site in the Hauora Hub for their supporting Active Recovery kaupapa. This campaign is focused on the benefits of active recovery after a low complexity injury like a sprain or strain. Staying active and connected can help you heal sooner - and get you back to what matters - like paddling!

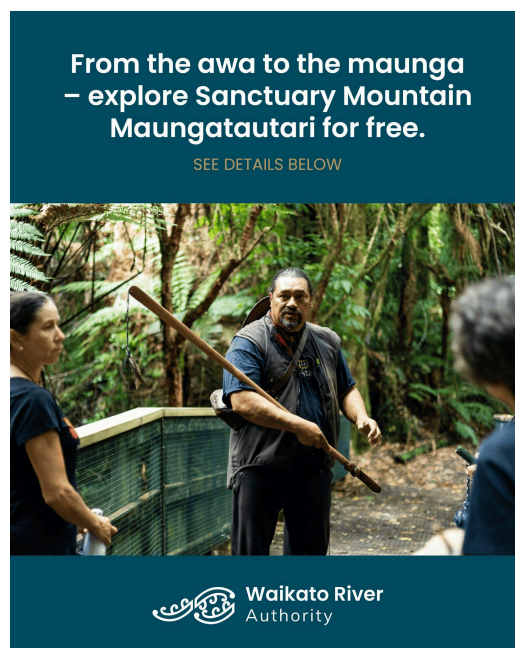
## MAUNGATAUTARI SANCTUARY - VISITS

Step into the ancient ngahere, awaken your senses, and discover Māori bush lore as you walk the maunga that stands above Karāpiro.

Waikato River Iwi Tuna Collective will be releasing thousands of Baby Tuna (Eels) on **Monday 12th**, straight after the last race (around 3pm). This is an awesome kaupapa and we hope you can all come and join us as we send the elvers along on their journey with some aroha from the Waka Ama whānau.





## **MERCHANDISE DESIGN - By Ben Thomason - AUAHA**

The design showcases the look at the water as it flows from the waka. It pays respect to the bodies of water that each waka and paddler must navigate in order to compete in this sport. It's a reminder that the whenua and taiao will be there long after the race is over. This is demonstrated by the repeating puhoro pattern down the center of the design. Specifically shaped in the shape of the wake behind a waka.

The sides of the design pay respect to whānau and friends, the supporters that line the banks in solidarity with the event, it allows us to reflect on the body of water and everyone who gives up their time to be at the kaupapa. This is shown via the taniko patterns on the ribs and sides of each shirt.

Lastly to create a connection with local mana whenua at Karāpiro: Ngāti Korokī Kahukura, and the work to promote the mahi they are doing with Tuna and elvers (baby eels) that can't migrate up the awa past the dam, based on the released 20,000 elvers during the event the tuna is shown in the middle the water and people pattern on each garment.

## **CLUB TROPHIES**

The Trophies were carved by Matahi Whakataka-Brightwell who has been instrumental in the re-birth and growth of the sport of Waka Ama in Aotearoa.

### **Waka Ama Sprint Nationals Club Points Trophy**

The first is a trophy that recognises club paddling excellence and achievement. Points will be accumulated throughout the week from all finals, and the club with the most points at the end of the week will be awarded this honour. In 2025 the trophy was again awarded to **Horouta Waka Hoe** who topped the club points for the 13th time in 14 years.



### **Ace Cuthers Memorial Club Spirit Award**

The second trophy was carved and named in honour of Ace Cuthers who we sadly lost in 2010. It is the “Ace Cuthers Memorial Club Spirit Award”. It will be chosen by the Volunteers and Officials at the event. They will take into consideration the actions of the club throughout the week and their performance on and off the water. The winning club in 2025 was **Nga Hoe Horo**. As a club they embodied the values of Waka Ama throughout the event - Manaakitanga, Whanaungatanga, Hauora, Tū Tangata. A true reflection of all working together as one.

**Both trophies will be on display all week in the Don Rowlands Centre and will be awarded at the final medal presentation on Saturday 17th January.**

Each team is made up of 11-12 employees or contractors from an organisation; and has a mix of genders and abilities, and is limited in numbers of WAANZ affiliated club paddlers.

## WASTE MINIMISATION

The Mighty River Domain is continuing to work towards operating as a “Zero Waste” site.

- There will be a large **Waste “Sort yourself” Minimisation Station** set up along Vendor Lane.
- All clubs, paddlers, and spectators are expected to take their recycling and waste to the station, and sort it yourselves.
- There will be large skip bins labelled for flattened cardboard and rinsed plastic bottles / cans.
- There will be large wheelie bins labelled for glass and food waste.
- There will be smaller wheelie bins labelled for general waste.
- All bins are to remain at the Sorting Station. **Please do not move them to your own club tent sites.**
- The station will be manned each day from 8am - 5pm (or until 30 mins after the last race), by a group of Kaitiāo (Volunteers), to ensure patrons use the correct bins for their waste.
- Bins will be monitored regularly and emptied by venue staff as required
- There **will not** be the capacity to remove broken umbrellas, broken chairs or gazebos, chilly bins, or other large items, so please must take these with you when leaving
- Clubs will not be issued with black rubbish bags, or individual rubbish boxes.
- Please encourage your teams to bring a **refillable drink bottle** to fill from the water stations.
- Please encourage whanau to bring a **reusable keep cup for hot/cold drinks at vendor sites**
- Recycling stations will still be set up around the venue for glass, plastic, cans and food scraps

**We remind everyone as kaitiaki to reduce, recycle and reuse as much as possible at the 2026 Waka Ama Nationals and work with the Mighty River Domain operating as a “Zero Waste” site.**

## **W1 WEIGHING PROCESS**

### **IMPORTANT – PLEASE SHARE THIS INFORMATION WITH ALL W1 PADDLERS AND MANAGERS**

- **W1 Waka (hull, ama, and Kiato) must all weigh a minimum of 14kgs (fully rigged)**
- We will not be weighing all W1 waka prior to the racing
- The first 3 Waka in each race will be weighed as they come off the water at the end of their race.
- Paddlers are responsible for ensuring that their waka has weights in it when they race, if it needs weighing up
- **It is the paddler's responsibility to ensure that the waka weighs 14kg when they race.**
- The scales will be set up prior to races during the W1 drop off times. Paddlers are encouraged to get their waka weighed on the official scales to check its weight prior to racing, if in doubt.

#### **These are the ONLY W1 Drop off times:**

**4pm - 7pm - Tuesday January 13th**

**6am - 7am - Wednesday January 14th**

- There is no restriction to the amount or type of W1 that can be used for this event.
- W1 must only be dropped off at the allocated times above
- Drop off access is via Gate 1, but there is no parking available in the area.
- Space will be marked by region. Please check in with your regional coordinator for your area
- Your W1 is your responsibility.
- Bring your own bungs for your waka and look after them.
- You must have a number holder attached to your waka
- A limited supply of number holders will be onsite, and can be purchased from the admin building for \$6 each. Please bring your own duct tape.
- Or Number Holders can be ordered online for \$6 - <https://waka-ama-nz-shop.myshopify.com/>
- There will be access to the race course for W1s **AFTER the prizegiving on Tuesday 16th, and not before 5pm – there will be no lake access on Wednesday morning.**

For W1 day, the loading bay bank will be marked out for each region. Regional coordinators are expected to monitor this space and ensure access ways are not blocked. Paddlers are responsible for storing W1 in allocated spaces without causing damage to any other waka.

**W1 Waka Pick Up/Collection - All W1 waka not required for the Regional W1 250m events on Thursday, must be removed from Loading Bay after racing on Wednesday.** First access will be granted from 3pm/the start of the Finals. Then on Thursday after the Regional W1 event, the rest of the W1 waka must also be uplifted from Loading Bay to clear the space. **Access will be granted from 4pm, at the end of the Dash events.**

**ALL W1 WAKA MUST COMPLETE THE CHECK, CLEAN, DRY PROCESS, AND BE PRESSURE-WASHED AND TAGGED BEFORE THEY CAN LEAVE THE LOADING BAY.**  
**PLEASE BE PATIENT AND FOLLOW THE INSTRUCTIONS OF THE KAITĪAO**

## **BIOSECURITY INFORMATION**

As kaitiaki of our roto and awa we will continue to follow the **Check, Clean, Dry** steps for our Waka Ama events, to ensure we do not spread the freshwater clams or any other invasive species in our waterways. For more information on the clam, please visit the [Ministry for Primary Industries website](#)

All waka, hoe, life jackets/PFDs, clothing and footwear will need to be **Checked** and washed **Clean** of any visible debris before leaving Lake Karāpiro. There will be high pressure wash stations set up for all W1 and W6 waka, ama and kiato in the loading bay area - **ALL waka will be washed and tagged, before they are released from the Loading bay area.** Please do your part and follow the instructions of the Kaitiāao. In addition, there will again be educational dunking bins for life jackets/PFDs, clothing, and footwear along the exit pathway.

**All Paddlers must also follow the [Check, Clean and Dry process](#) for all clothing and PFDs on return to their whare.**

#### How to 'Check Clean Dry' when you move

Follow these steps when you move between lakes and rivers.

**✓ Check – for what is visible**

Remove any plant matter, mud or visible clams from your gear and leave it at the river or lake bank, or put it in the rubbish.

Drain all river or lake water from your boat and gear.

**✓ Clean – for what is not visible**

Blast your gear and craft with tap water onto grass, not into a stormwater system or drain.

For absorbent materials, use one of these treatments and refer to the manufacturer's instructions if needed:

- Soak in hot tap water (50°C to 55°C) for at least 5 minutes, or
- Soak in 5% bleach solution (5-litre mix = 250ml bleach in 4.75 litres water) for an hour, or
- Freeze till solid (overnight), or
- Soak in salt solution at 100ppt (parts per thousand) (5-litre mix = 500g salt in 5 litres warm water) for 4 hours.

For a full list of approved treatments, including options for situations where none of the above is suitable, refer to [Treatment options](#)

**✓ Dry – to be sure**

- **Gear:** allow gear to dry to touch, inside and out, then leave it to dry for at least 48 hours (2 days) before using again.
- **Watercraft:** dry areas inside the watercraft where water has pooled, for example with an old towel, and then leave the craft to dry for at least 48 hours (2 days). The hull of a watercraft will dry when towed.

These 'Check Clean Dry' steps will also help stop the spread of other freshwater pest species. For more information: visit the [Ministry for Primary Industries website](#)
